FINAL WORDS OF THE WEEK

Approaching Holocaust Memorial Day on the 27th January, we wanted to share a few thoughts to reflect upon for this week.

It has been 76 years since the liberation of Auschwitz, yet the lessons of the Holocaust remain prevalent to this day. Even in our modern 21st century world: hatred, racism and prejudice continue to prevail. The recent rise in xenophobia and intolerance underscores the need for us to never forget the alarming events which took place under the Nazi regime.

Never again. These words ring through our Holocaust Education. However, these words are hollow when genocide remains in existence. Holocaust Memorial Day has never been so pertinent.

How can man inflict such harm upon his fellow? What drives man to this unimaginable evil? Explained by Primo Levi, a Holocaust survivor:

"Monsters exist, but they are too few in number to be truly dangerous. More dangerous are the common men, the functionaries ready to believe and to act without asking questions"

The message expressed by Primo Levi is one of immense value. The power of standing up in the face of brutality resonates with us to this day. Evil is only able to flourish if the common man allows it to. Silence is simply not enough.

In the week leading up to Holocaust Memorial Day, we must commemorate the lives of the men, women and children who were wrongfully murdered by the Nazis.
