






Being a doctor

A career in medicine

It's a long haul....


- 1. 5/6 years at medical school including a BSc
 - 1. Phase 1: preclinical years
 - 2. Optional BSC (biochemistry, anatomy, psychology, history of medicine)
 - 3. Phase 2: Clinical Years
 - 4. Phase 3: final year
- 2. 2 years as a foundation doctor (FY1 & FY2)


in hospital and GP

- 3. 3-8 years as a specialty trainee
- Optional: research, teaching, other specialties, charity work, elective work, babies, career break

- A levels AAA
- Chemistry, Maths /Physics/ Biology plus one other

Personal Statement


- Well written
- Empathic and reflective

BMAT and/ or UCAT

- Exams for medicine
- 8 universities use BMAT
- 30+ medical schools

Experience


- Healthcare oriented (sitting in clinic, hospital, GP, care home)
- Care oriented work
- Leadership



You may not get into medicine first time!

- However bright you are
- However experienced you are
- It may take more than 1 year to be accepted
- 7000 places and 30 000 applicants
- A year off is good !!
 - Life experience
 - Travel
 - Earn money
 - Break before what is a demanding course

Personal statement Work Experience & Medical Experience

Most hospitals now have a formal system for getting work experience

Look through Hospital websites and contact them

GPs don't often take medical students but if they do usually year 12 or 13


On placements

- If you are in hospital / GP be polite and assertive
- Don't just sit in clinic , ask to shadow junior doctor
- Ask questions and see patients
- Don't just talk to doctors medicine is a team sport (nurses, Physios, OT, radiographer)

Doesn't have to be Hospitals or GPs

- **S**
- 1 LESS IS MORE: DON'T
- 2 NARRATIVE: "FROM THE AGE OF 2..."
- THINK OUTSIDE THE SCHOOL CURRICULUM
- 4 STRUCTURE IT COHERENTLY
- 5 CHECK CLAIMS OF KNOWLEDGE
- 6 EXPERIENCE ONLY WHEN RELEVANT
- 7 DEMONSTRATE INDEPENDENT RESEARCH
- 8 STAY RELEVANT
- 9 ENSURE YOU CAN EXPAND
 IF INTERVIEWED

□Motivation
☐ Understanding role of a doctor/wider context / NHS
☐ Examples of relevant work experience
☐ Reflection on what was learnt from such experiences
☐ Evidence of initiative/enterprise
☐Work/life balance

□Compassion and resilience



Be realistic (Oxford Cambridge Edinburgh Bristol Birmingham)


Spread your bets

Review every medical school and their entry criteria

- GCSEs & A levels
- UCAT & BMAT scores threshold (may need to change depending on score)
- Score for private vs state schools
- Background
- Ratios to patient

Location


- How far to come home

How are you tested?


Mix of MCQs, short answers and essay

What does it test?

- <u>Section 1 Aptitude Skills</u> (Score / 9 : Problem Solving & Data Analysis)
 - 35 questions in 60 minutes
- <u>Section 2 Scientific Knowledge & application</u> (Score /9: GCSE level Science & Maths)
 - 27 questions in 30 minutes
- <u>Section 3 Writing Task</u> (Score /5 for quality and Score A-E for quality of written English)
 - ∘ 1 of 3 questions − 30 minutes

When can I take it?

August OR October - when you take the test is your choice but Oxford only accept
 October sittings



UCAT

How are you tested?

• All MCQ! – this is done on a computer at a local test centre


What does it test? (Each section scored 300-900 and Situational Judgement Band 1-4)

- <u>Verbal Reasoning</u> Assesses the ability to critically evaluate information presented in a written form
 - 44 questions in 21 minutes
- <u>Abstract Reasoning</u> Assesses use of convergent & divergent thinking to infer relationships from information
 - 55 questions in 24 minutes
- Quantitative Reasoning Assesses the ability to critically evaluate information presented in a numerical form
 - 36 questions in 24 minutes
- <u>Decision Making</u> Assesses the ability to make sound decisions and judgements using complex information
 - 29 questions in 31 minutes
- <u>Situational Judgement</u> Understand real world situations & identify critical factors & appropriate behaviour in dealing with them
 - 69 questions in 26 minutes

Interviews

MMI common in most medical schools

Multi Mini Interviews

6-8 short interviews

Each station marked separately

Answer question, complete a task, role play

Interviews

Most questions will be predictable but still they are often answered badly

- Why do you want to do medicine
- What are your strengths and weaknesses
- What inspired you to do medicine
- What is it like to be a doctor
- What does a doctor do

Some questions will be designed to show your knowledge

Some questions will be designed to test your thinking?

Some will be politically relevant

Some will be personal?

Some will be relating to experience eg work/ conflict


