Dear Parents/Carers,

Please do encourage reading with your children.

Research shows that reading for pleasure has a significant impact on attainment across the curriculum. Reading is also brilliant for boosting confidence, for developing empathy and for escaping into fictional worlds.

We have had a hugely successful term at JFS with students making significant gains in read. We will aim to re-test students to check for progress termly but reading for twenty minutes per day really is invaluable. Please see table below in terms of what the research suggests.
